Man Responds to God

24 What does my faith have to do with the Church?

No one can believe alone and by himself, just as no one can live alone and by himself. We receive the faith from the Church and live it out in fellowship with the people with whom we share our faith. [166-169, 181]

Faith is the most personal thing a person has, yet it is not a private matter. Anyone who wants to believe must be able to say both “I” and “we”, because a faith you cannot share and communicate would be irrational. The individual believer gives his free assent to the “we believe” of the Church. From her he received the faith. She was the one who handed it down through the centuries and then to him, preserved it from falsifications, and caused it to shine forth again and again. Believing is therefore participation in a common conviction. The faith of others supports me, just as the fervor of my faith enkindles and strengthens others. The Church emphasizes the “I” and the “we” of faith by using two professions of faith in her liturgies: the Apostles’ Creed, the CREED that begins with “I believe” (Credo), and the Great Creed of Nicaea-Constantinople, which in its original form starts with the words “We believe” (Credimus).

To the Faithful of the Archdiocese of Toronto,

Last weekend we began the season of Advent, and began using the Third edition of the Roman Missal in our celebration of the Eucharist.

When the celebration of Mass shifted from Latin to the language of the people some 40 years ago, the original English translation was not intended to be permanent. Over the last decade, extensive work by translators, theologians, poets, musicians and bishops has taken place to develop a text more faithful to the original Latin. With more than 3,000 prayers contained in the Roman Missal used by our clergy to celebrate Mass, this project took a significant amount of time and resources.

The results of these efforts is the Third Edition of the Roman Missal that we began using last weekend and at every celebration of the Eucharist moving forward. There are some new responses that we will need to be familiar with as a family of faith. You will also notice many changes in the words that the priest uses in our celebration of the Eucharist.

Our clergy have attended several workshops on the new translation and you will notice numerous resources both at the parish and archdiocesan level to assist with the transition. Our priests have been encourage to help educate parishioners through the use of the homilies, bulletin announcements, pew cards, workshops and other resources. We also have a dedicated website at www.archtoronto.org/romanmissal available anytime to provide you with additional information.

As we walk into a newly renovated room, we marvel at the beauty of a space that maintains its strong foundation yet has taken on a new magnificence after many years of use. We pray that the Third Edition of the Roman Missal will bring us new appreciation for a sacrament that is the summit of our experience as Catholics. Renewed in Worship, Renewed in Christ, let us walk together as this new chapter of our faith journey unfolds.
