The Sixth Commandment: You shall not commit adultery.

421. Why are all methods of preventing the conception of a child not equally good?

The Church recommends the refined methods of selfobservation and natural family planning (NFP) as methods of deliberately regulating conception. These are in keeping with the dignity of man and woman; they respect the innate laws of the female body; they demand mutual affection and consideration and therefore are a school of love. [2370-2372, 2399]

The Church pays careful attention to the order of nature and sees in it a deep meaning. For her it is therefore not a matter of indifference whether a couple manipulates the woman's fertility or instead makes use of the natural alternation of fertile and infertile days. It is no accident that Natural Family Planning is called natural: it is ecological, holistic, healthy, and an exercise in partnership. On the other hand, the Church rejects all artificial means of contraception - namely, chemical methods ("the Pill"), mechanical methods (for example, condom, intra-uterine device, or IUD), and surgical methods (sterilization) - since these attempt to separate the sexual act from its procreative potential and block the total self-giving of husband and wife. Such methods can even endanger the women's health, have an abortifacient effect (= cause a very early abortion), and in the long run be detrimental to the couple's love life.

422. What can a childless couple do?

Married couples who suffer from infertility can accept any medical assistance that does not contradict the dignity of the human person, the rights of the child to be conceived, and the Holiness of the Sacrament of Matrimony. [2375, 2379]

There is no absolute right to have a child. Every child is a gift from God. Married couples to whom this gift has been denied, even though they have exhausted all permissible medical means of assistance, can take in foster children or adopt children or become socially involved in some other way, for instance, by caring for abandoned children.

THE HOLY DOOR

Pope Francis has declared a Jubilee Year of Mercy: twelve months for us to focus on and deepen our gratitude for the loving mercy of God. As with all jubilee years, the Year of Mercy will include the use of a Holy Door, a specially designated entrance that has spiritual and symbolic meaning for Catholics.

In this Jubilee of Mercy, passing through a Holy Door is part of the pilgrimage that all Catholics are encouraged to make, whether during a trip to Rome or a trip to the cathedrals or specially designated churches in their own dioceses. These pilgrimage come with special graces, and they allow each of us to share in the many blessings of the Holy Year.

Jesus said, "I AM the Door" (Jn 10:7), bringing to fruition the words of the psalmist, who said, "This is the door of the Lord where the just may enter" (see 118:20). Passing through the Holy Door symbolizes our leaving the world outside and entering into the realm of salvation. As Pope St. John Paul II said, the Holy Door "evokes the passage from sin to grace which every Christian is called to accomplish" (Incarnationis Mysterium).

On February 6 at 10:30 am, a chartered coach will leave St. Aidan Church to St. Patrick Church on McCall St., Toronto. Registration will be taken at the gift shop - \$10.00 per person. This trip will be an opportunity for us to gain a plenary indulgence applicable to oneself or to the death.

How to obtain the Jubilee Indulgence

In addition to passing through a Holy Door, each pilgrim is to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation, receive the Holy Eucharist while reflecting on God's great gift of mercy, make a profession of faith (recite either the Apostles' or Nicene Creed), and pray for the Holy Father and his intentions (an Our Father and a Hail Mary are recommended)
