76. What about pre-implantation diagnosis (PID)?

New medical procedures are not always advantageous for a pregnant woman and her unborn child. With Pre-Implantation Diagnosis (PID) there is an obvious danger of setting an arbitrary value on human life and being selective. Thus children with genetic anomalies or suspected of being handicapped are screened and not allowed to live. More and more often, PID is used even to end the life of a child who is not of the sex desired by the parents. Critics warn that we are going down the path toward "designer babies". No physicians and not even the parents of an unborn child have the right to decide whether or not the life of a human being is worth living. Many disabled people perceive the debate itself over PID as blant discrimination: they would not be alive today if PID had already existed when they were conceived. Christians can never approve of selecting among human embryos.

77. Is euthanasia morally permissible?

The direct killing of a human being, even if he is terminally ill, is always against the Fifth Commandment (Ex 20:13): You shall not kill. That applies to my own life, too. Only God is the master of life and death. On the other hand, to support a dving person and supply him with all possible medical and human care so as to alleviate his sufferings is to practice love of neighbor and perform a work of mercy. The hospice movement and Palliative Medicine provide important services in this regard. The principle must be: We help the dying person (and not: "We help the person to die"). Accordingly, from a medical and moral perspective, it may even be imperative to discontinue procedures that offer no hope of improvement and also to use palliative means, even if they shorten the patient's life. In all this, however, the patient's will must be taken into consideration. If no directives have been made and the patient himself can no longer state his wishes, they can be expressed by an authorized representative, but they must, however, be consistent with the moral law.

'VOCATION SEEDS'

If we need examples of persons responding to God's call, look at Abraham and Sarah - called in old age to leave their country and have a child. Then Abraham was asked to sacrifice that child. SIGN-UP SUNDAYS! February 24/25 & March 3/4 We Need Your Help!

Cardinal Collins and bishops across Ontario are asking for an email address from every Catholic family in their community, with a goal of 100,000 email addresses collected by the end of February 2018. This information will be used locally by Cardinal Collins and trusted faith partners to communicate periodically with you on issues of particular importance for the Catholic community.

The first campaign of 2018 is the Call for Conscience, inviting our elected Members of Provincial Parliament (MPPs) and those seeking office this June to increase funding/access to palliative care, to protect health care workers wishing to abstain from any involvement in euthanasia/assisted suicide and to protect faith –based facilities from participation in euthanasia/assisted suicide.
