274. How does a Christian get started making peace?

Peace does not begin in trenches or around treaty tables. The peace that comes from above always begins in the heart of an individual human being; from there it spreads. A Christian finds peace in and with himself through prayer and listening to the Word of God. The sacraments are important, too, especially Confession, which is a real sacrament of peace. One attains inner peace also when one takes the first step and meets one's neighbor in real charity. In order to live with one another in peace, Christians know of no more effective method than a permanent willingness to forgive and to be reconciled. "To him who strikes you on the cheek, offer the other also" (Lk 6:29). Your own peace radiates: in the family, in your circle of friends, and in society as a whole.

275. What is peace?

Many say peace is the absence of war; other think that peace is a stable equilibrium between hostile powers. These definitions are inadequate, however. Peace is the tranquility of order and, more deeply, happiness in God's good order. This sort of peace is our goal. We find ourselves in the path of peace when we work in justice and love toward a world that is ordered as God intended. Moreover, we find ourselves alongside all people who honestly and sincerely seek the truth, care for the well-being and safety of their fellow human beings in justice, and unselfishly give them their love. And at the same time we work for God's original cause when we promote the rights of all human beings and defend them in every way.

ASH WEDNESDAY IS ON FEBRUARY 26

Ash Wednesday, like Good Friday is a day of Fasting and Abstinence from meat. The law of abstinence from meat is binding on those who are 14 and older. The law of fasting is binding on those who are 18 to 59 years of age. The requirement for fasting is that you can have one full meal and two other small meals in such a way that the two small meals don't add up to a full meal (and of course , no meat). If required you may drink beverages between meals but not something that is very filling (such as milkshakes). Mass times for Ash Wednesday are: 9:00 am, 1:00 pm St. Aidan's School Mass (anyone can attend), and 7:30 pm (with Perpetual Help devotions).

MASS ETIQUETTE AND INFORMATION

Not chewing the HOST: After having received Holy Communion, you should not chew Our Lord. You should allow the Host to dissolve in your mouth and swallow it as soon as possible. Part of the reason for this is out of respect for Our Lord, truly present in the Eucharist. We don't want to treat Him as ordinary food, that we munch on. Another reason is that by chewing the Host, we are likely to have Particles remain between our teeth. Who knows what might happen to those Particles later; mixed with other food, stuck in chewing gum, or flossed out and into the garbage. There are, of course, exceptions. The priest must chew the Sacred Host because he receives a much larger portion. There may also be some people, usually the elderly, who have very dry mouths, who need to chew to be able to get the Host to go down.

Lenten Resolutions: Every Catholic is called to strengthen their spiritual life during the season of Lent. We should all make reasonable but challenging resolutions in three areas of our lives; our prayer life, self-denial, and charitable works. Pick something for each of these three that you can reasonably do for the entire period of Lent, but something that will have a good level of challenge or difficulty. Keep in mind that your penances, or resolutions, should not be a burden to others. Some suggestion examples: Pray more, read from New Testament daily, come early to Mass to prayerfully prepare; Give up TV or watch less, reduce time on social media, don't snack, give up sweets, exercise regularly, don't sleep in, take a colder shower; Be more helpful around the home, visit or call relatives or old friends, do nice things for others, be more cheerful, befriend someone, give to charitable organizations, be kind and polite.
