Holy Days of Obligation

Catholics are required to attend Mass on all Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation. Attending a Vigil Mass on the previous day fulfills this obligation (such as the regularly scheduled Saturday evening Mass). In Canada there are only two Holy Days of Obligation that do not usually fall on a Sunday; Christmas and New Year's Day. Please note that this Christmas season, December 25 and January 1 fall on a Monday. You must attend one Christmas Mass and one of the preceding Sunday Masses. For New Year's you must attend one New Year's Mass and one of the preceding Sunday Masses

In other words, you must attend two obligation Masses on each of these weekends, from Saturday to the Monday.

Epiphany Blessing

The Solemnity of Epiphany is traditionally on January 6 but is now celebrated on the Sunday that falls closed to it. This 2024 it falls on Sunday January 7th. There is a tradition that on the feast of Epiphany, the head of each household would lead his/her family in a prayer and blessing of their home. The parish priest cannot bless everyone's home and so the head of each family would do this every year. After doing the blessing, he will sprinkle holy water about the house and use blessed chalk to mark the main entrance lintel of their home with the following: 20+C+M+B+24 (the number would change every year; to indicate the year we are in). The letters stand for the three Magi or Wisemen: Caspar, Melchor and Balthasar. They also represent the Latin blessing: Christus mansionem benedicat, which means "May Christ bless this house". Fr. Steven will try to have blessed chalk available on the feast of Epiphany for everyone to bless their homes. It is always a good idea to have holy water in your homes. All you need is a small container.
