This Sunday's Gospel Reflection

Jesus proclaims to all the people, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news." What is the "good news" and why should people repent of their sins? The good news is that we can have our sins forgiven; that with the help of God, we can have better, more fulfilling relationships with everyone, including God; that we can be much more fulfilled and happy now; and that through Jesus we can make it to heaven to be totally happy forever. The reason we need to turn away from sins and repent of them is because sin is an obstacle to our acquiring all these things. It is true that every sin affords immediate short-termed satisfaction, but in the long run living a sinful life will make us unhappy.

The Offertory Procession

You may have noticed that we have resumed the Offertory Procession of having a couple or a family bring forward the water and wine as well as some of the altar breads that will be used in the consecration during Mass. This bringing forth of such "gifts" was a common practice in the early Church. People would bring forward their own personal gifts, which would later be distributed to the poor or used by the priest or used for the upkeep of the church. Such gifts were given out of charity for the honour of God and for those who needed it, and so this sacrificial giving is something greatly blessed by God. Seeing this procession is reminder that we have a duty to support the church and to help the poor and less fortunate. Our motive in giving should be not just a sense of obligation but charity. In addition to giving money, we are encouraged to offer our very selves and everything we have, including the value of all our good works. These more personal gifts will also be sanctified or blessed by God during the Mass. Similar to how the gifts on the altar are blessed by the priest and are transformed into The Body and Blood of Christ at the consecration, so our personal gifts, which we should prayerfully offer during the Offertory, will be blessed and transform into something of greater value to ourselves.
